

Recitation:

Recitation is a required and important part of this 4 credit course. Your recitation grade will primarily be based on quizzes given in recitation.

Homework Assignments:

There will be 8 problem sets due over the course of the semester. I will cover all necessary material to complete these problem sets and prepare for exams in class. In addition, I will post some extra study questions before each exam. These will not account for part of your grade, but they may be very helpful.

In-class Assignments:

There will be 3 in-class assignments during the semester each worth 2% of your total grade. **If you miss an in-class assignment, you will receive a zero unless you are ill and can provide proof (e.g. a letter from the student health center). If you miss an in-class assignment with a valid excuse then the weight of your final will be increased.**

I adhere strictly to the University guidelines on Incompletes (“An IF is given only when students, *beyond their control*, have been unable to complete course requirements. A substantial amount of work must have been *satisfactorily completed* before approval for such a grade is completed.”). Bad grades, unsatisfactory performance, too many credit hours, work conflicts, etc. are not reasons for an incomplete.

I am adamant about giving each student an equal opportunity to perform well in the course, so there will be no extra credit opportunities that are not offered to the entire class. *You should focus your efforts on learning the material and doing well on the exams.*
